From the Pastor:

"So we do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day. For this slight momentary affliction is preparing us for an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure, because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal. For we know that if the earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." 2 Corinthians 4:16-5:1

"War cannot end war." That quote is from tenth-grade me. I still remember

writing it. We were tasked by Mr. Grinn to read and respond to the short story, *The Survivor*, written by Walter F. Moudy in 1965. In it, war between the United States and Russia has been replaced by Olympic War Games, where 100 specially trained soldiers fight to the death every four years to decide who the current world power is. Moudy's story is prescient for its view of live television coverage of the War Games and terribly insightful about the horrible impact that being a soldier can have on the human psyche along with the ripples in society that causes. Mr. Grinn asked us whether the Olympic War Games are a viable

solution to the problem of war. I stand by my answer, emphatically no.

I need to contextualize that answer a bit. I have come to the realization that war can end war, but only in the worst way, which is the annihilation of the human race. Also, it's important to me for you to know that both of my grandfathers served in World War II and one of the sponsors for the baptism of Anna and Kate was an Army Ranger and still serves in the military. Although my grandfathers rarely talked about their service, even when I asked, I have always been proud of their answering that call at that time in the course of world events. Thomas and I generally talk sports and the fantasy football league we play in together. Despite my black and white answer about war, I understand that there are lots of gray areas in the world.

In case you don't know already, we as the ELCA have produced Social Statements, which are meant to be teaching documents that help us members to be guided in a biblical and Lutheran understanding on particular issues and present a united voice to wider society on what a majority of us would say on a topic. I encourage you to take the time to read them, and in particular at this time, the one titled *For Peace in God's World*, adopted in 1995. Our Church declares war is a failure while simultaneously acknowledging the possibility of their necessity in a broken world. Likewise, there is thoughtful support for the people who choose the military as a vocation to defend the powerless while also examining how military action itself might be the lesser of two evils in a particular situation. As Christians, we are called to work for peace, God's peace, in the world in every way that we can, but we also recognize that God's kingdom has not yet come in full, so we remain imperfect people with imperfect choices to make at times applying God's love to them as best as we can.

We live in the in between times, Christ has come – Christ will come again, when sin still affects the course of life and choices we must make, which leaves questions and gray areas. However, that does not change the truth that violence will never be the final solution to violence and war will never end the existence of wars, short of cataclysmic oblivion. In *The Survivor*, the TV analysts claim that the Olympic War Games, along with the death of nearly 200 people every four years, is far better than a world war. Perhaps it is, but it's still not an acceptable final solution. It's the same argument the Pharisees make when they believe that Jesus will stir up the people to a revolution against Rome. Better that one man dies, Jesus, not one of them of course, than the whole nation get crushed. You can almost appreciate the logic in their reasoning, except that Jesus did not and would not have advocated for armed uprising. He lived and taught a better way.

The Way of Jesus, the Way to which we are called, is the Way of Peace. Sure, Jesus said once that he came not for peace but to bring a sword, but that was a method of saying that the status quo of Rome's version of peace, won and kept through violence, would no longer be allowed to stand as the beacon of what peace truly means. He was flipping those accepted norms on their head. Still, I've often wondered on the night of his betrayal, why he called the sword that Peter brought from the upper room to the garden "enough." Why not tell him to leave it behind altogether? Certainly, one sword wouldn't be enough to defend against the mob who would come to arrest him, and Jesus is in the business of multiplying loaves and love not swords. Perhaps that's the key. One sword wasn't enough to repel violence with violence. Instead, one sword was enough for it to be used as a symbol for Jesus' rejection of violent solutions. Peter swings it once. Jesus heals the resulting wound and refuses to let it be used any more. Enough. Jesus knows where he's going and how he's getting there. More importantly, he knows why.


Jesus is headed to the cross, the ultimate place of violence. It exemplifies the terror of domination in response to the threat of insurgency. Along the way, Jesus will be subjected to verbal, physical, and spiritual brutality. Yet, he refuses to answer in kind, rather only with kindness. Jesus absorbs the violence, hatred, warring hearts, and evil of the world and doesn't fight back. At his birth, the angelic army of God proclaims peace, and despite their power at his disposal, Jesus lives that peace all the way to his death.

The author of Ecclesiastes says there is a time for war and a time for peace. As long as we live in a broken world, he may be right. However, Jesus knows that neither war nor violence is the ultimate solution. After all, the kind of peace created by violence and war are only temporary. The kind of love that bears all things is the only definitive way to create and sustain peace in the world. Jesus accepts the violence of the cross because he wants a better way for us. He wants peace for us - peace between God and us and us and each other. It's by no means an easy way. No, the Way to which we are called is far more challenging than simply allowing rage to take over, like turning the other cheek instead of responding an eye for an eye. God's love is the only power strong enough to create God's peace. May you have the strength to wield it mightily.




Jazz Band, the Sunrise Singers, and the Drama Club.






