From the Pastor:

For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Galatians 5:14

Every council meeting, we begin with devotions. Usually, I have a reading selection or poem for us to reflect upon and discuss which relates to our yearly theme. This past month, I invited our council members to share moments of mercy – places or ways they had seen mercy in action, whether they had initiated it, been on the receiving end, or simply observed mercy at

work. We had a thoughtful conversation, as many of our council members shared instances of mercy and their impact. As that sharing and reflecting drew to a close, one council member turned to me and said something like, "Well, how about you, Pastor? Where have you seen mercy recently?" All eyes turned to me.

Fortunately, I had very recently been on the receiving end of someone's mercy, and could now extend that blessing by sharing the story with others. However, it involved our church softball team and felt trivial in the grand scheme of things. Consequently, on the one hand, I felt sheepish about being THE Pastor and not having some grand story of mercy to share, but on the other hand, I didn't want to fail at having something to share, especially since it was my original question and everyone else had engaged with it so well. I went with it. Here's the story.

On the first night of games for us, we had trouble getting ten players to field a full team. Matt Otto had gotten sick not long before heading to the field, knocking him out and Nicole with him. Thankfully, he was able to send us Nicole's dad, Jim, who stepped in and stepped up well for us. Brian was on his way back from working in Erie, so we only had 8 players at the field when you need 9 to start. Willing to do whatever the team needed, Ron Blinn volunteered to go from coaching third base to catching. He would go on to reach base safely more times than not, like the seasoned pro he is. Eventually Brian arrived, and we had our 10.

Early on, it seemed like we would cruise to an easy, certain victory. Then the other team came storming back. Every time we put up a lead that would put the game out of reach, they would score a bunch of runs, too. The game was drawing to a close and we were trying to generate a safe enough lead that we could hold on in the bottom half of the frame. I was on third base, hoping to score. Cam strode to the plate. He took a couple of pitches and then stepped out for a practice swing. It was then that I noticed Cam had the wrong bat.

The wrong bat seems like no big deal, but this wasn't just having the wrong size or length. He had the bat that is only allowed to be used by ladies on the team and people over 60 years old. Cam is neither, so I called, "Hey, Cam! You need to change your bat." Turns out trying to be fair and calling attention to the mistake wasn't the wrong thing to do, but it certainly caused more waves than intended.

Realizing what was going on, their coach, who was also pitching, announced that Cam was now out for bringing that bat to the plate. That stunk, of course, but it was about to get worse. Immediately, the umpire announced that Cam was not only out, but also thrown out of the game along with the bat. According to our rules, coming to the plate with an illegal bat is an automatic ejection from the game. There is no wiggle room, even when you were just trying fix the situation.

In that moment, though, their coach, with backing from his team, asked the umpire to ignore the ejection part of the rules. He said, "I know you are short on players and don't have anyone to replace him. We don't need him to be thrown out." The umpire was caught between the letter of the law and the grace and mercy trying to be shown by the other team. After some deliberation with the other team's coach, he decided to honor their request for mercy. Cam was out, but not out of the game.

If everything was exactly fair, then perhaps their mercy would have been rewarded with a come from behind win. They certainly gave up a strategic advantage by asking to let Cam stay in the game, and couldn't be blamed for following the rules if they have passively allowed his ejection to stand. However, they actively pursued mercy, even when it didn't serve in the interest of them winning. We held on and won that game by two runs. It's my hope that the joy of being merciful and kind outweighed any sense that losing the game meant that they chose poorly by advocating for mercy. No matter the outcome of the game, I believe we were all better off as Christians, and human beings in general, for getting to be a part of a moment of mercy.


That's the story. It's nothing grand. They even lost the game, maybe in part because of their decision to be merciful. Yet, I believe they were more than conquerors for walking in the merciful footsteps of Christ, and even more so since it wasn't to their immediate advantage. Also, in general, I don't think we are ready for big moments of mercy or courage or forgiveness naturally. I think when the hardest times come, and we're able to display the gestures of lovingkindness that leave people in awe wondering how you could forgive so big or love so well, it's because we have been merciful in the small moments. We've practiced at it over the course of time. Those small repetitions reinforce our ability to be merciful again and again, and ready us for the hardest times, from which the grand stories of the power of God's mercy come.

Speaking of sharing stories of moments of mercy, if you have one or a dozen stories of moments of mercy, whether you extended it, received it, or witnessed it, then please share the story with me or send it into the office so we can share them in the upcoming newsletters to help further share the beautiful story of God's love in action in this world. Thank you.


AS of now, I am all done with chemo and radiation. I managed them decently and am very happy to get back to my normal!







President Adam Price called the meeting to order at 7:14 P.M. Following this, the Pastor shared a devotion that reflected on the previous Sunday's Gospel lesson, addressing goodness and mercy that have followed me all the days of our lives. He led us in a discussion followed by prayers.

Minutes: Minutes from the April 8th meeting were read and approved. Linda motioned to accept the minutes, and it was seconded by Staci. Motion carried,


