From the Pastor:



All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. 2 Corinthians 5:18-19

Somewhere along the line a few years ago, it became clear that we had fallen into a parenting mistake. When the girls would receive an apology from their sisters or anyone else, they would most often respond with, "It's okay." Sure, it doesn't seem like a big deal, which is why it was so easy to let happen. In order to prevent overreaction from

the offended, we'd often tell them that what happened to them was wrong but they were okay. Other times, when they were worried about us continuing to be upset, we'd reassure them by say everything was okay. Soon, "It's okay" was becoming the standard response to apologies, and that's not okay.

Perhaps it seems a little dramatic to decry "It's okay" so harshly. That's fair. Undoubtedly, such a reply can convey an earnest attempt to offer reconciliation and healing from the wrong that was committed. The offended can relax knowing that retribution is not planned. However, there is an underlying permissiveness that can communicate the wrong message about the words or actions that created the rift. Responding to an apology with "It's okay" might send the message that what transpired was actually fine all along and no apology was ever really necessary.

Increasingly aware of this potential, and definitely wrong, subliminal message, we started to course correct. I found myself saying, "It's okay. Well, what you did wasn't okay. That was wrong, but I'm okay and our relationship is okay now too." Yes, I was saying the word okay more times per average word than I am in this article. Obviously, that wasn't the correct fix to the problem. Fortunately, there exists a phrase that much more clearly articulates that the words or actions were wrong but the consequences of that situation do no remain or linger and the relationship has been repaired. We started to make a conscious effort to have us all reply to apologies with "I forgive you."

Forgiveness is a key aspect of the loving, merciful nature of God. As a result, confessing our sins and brokenness is an integral component of our on-going relationship with God who made us, redeems us, and sustains us. We are renewed and our relationship with God is restored through confession and the mercy of God's forgiveness. Likewise, Jesus calls his disciples, like us, to be forgiving and merciful as God is forgiving and merciful to us. Despite this call, sometimes we push back against mercy, because it seems like forgiveness condones the sin, sending the message that it was all okay.

Jesus encourages us to forgive the same person for the same thing repeatedly. This seems like Jesus isn't bothered by sin. Yet, Jesus directs people he forgives to go and sin no more. What's going on here? Which is it? Perhaps it's some of both.

God is loving and merciful and desires a life-giving relationship with us, and for us to have that with each other. This is why Jesus instructs us to keep forgiving, to keep giving reconciliation and life-giving relationships a chance. However, since God cares so much about all of Creation and desires abundance of life for all, God also cares about sin and brokenness and their potentially devastating effects. God doesn't want us to keep hurting each other and ourselves, so Jesus instructs those he meets to leave sin behind and gives us the Holy Spirit to help us grow in righteousness, our reflection of God's image and likeness.

Mercy and forgiveness have never been about condoning sin. God is grieved by sin, but is grieved even more by the loss of relationship with any of His children. The parable of the one lost sheep out of one hundred and the Prodigal Son/Father come to mind. Forgiveness doesn't say that the wrong is right or even okay. Forgiveness addresses sins, brokenness, hurts, mistakes, shortcomings, rifts head-on and names them for what they are - bad and painful. Mercy, then, chooses against continuing to perpetuate the pain, which comes through vengeance, retribution, and grudge-holding, and instead, chooses to give healing and reconciliation a chance.

In the economy of God's loving-kindness, sin is still sin and death-dealing, but Jesus absorbs that death so we don't have to be defined by our failures. Offering forgiveness like God means acknowledging the wrong as wrong but deciding not to know a person as the hurt they caused or as the sum or their mistakes, no matter how egregious. Rather, mercy invites us to open the door to the kind of love that Jesus calls us to when he tells us to love our enemies and be merciful like our Heavenly Father is merciful. In mercy, God sees us with hopeful, loving eyes, envisioning in us the child of God we were made to be. When we forgive, we participate with God in that hopeful vision of the other. We give each other the chance to try again to be the people God intended us to be.

Hurt isn't okay. True reconciliation would be impossible if we pretended it was. Forgiveness acknowledges the pain caused and then willingly gives the offender a chance to be renewed. Maybe they won't be, but godly love compels us to pray and do everything else in our power to make it so. Should mercy fail to transform the other, it still changes us for the better. A heart of mercy cuts off the power over us that the pain caused by the offender has and mirrors the very heart of God, which is definitely better than okay.

SPECIAL NOTE:

Sisters and Brothers, I need to call our attention to the financial aspect of the health of our congregation. We have managed to accomplish great things in the last few years, including major renovation projects and giving to our neighbors in need. However, in the meantime, a surplus of over \$10,000 in the Current Fund from a couple of years ago has become a deficit of a few thousand dollars. Like I mentioned, our congregation has still been very generous in our offerings toward the accomplishment of a myriad of very needed projects. Over that same time, we have experienced the death of many members and high inflation in the economy around us, which also increases the costs of billing covered under Current Expenses. God is doing great things through us, and we are certainly a Spirit-filled community. I have full confidence that we will continue to be able to help our neighbors in need, address much-needed building renovations, and also make up the gap in our Current Fund in the coming months. Thank you for being the generous people of God that makes the certainty of that hope possible. With love, Pastor




