"May God be merciful to us and bless us; may the light of God's face shine upon us." Psalm 67:1

"Oh no! Are you going to be doing that weird singing part in the service again Daddy?"

This question popped up from one of my girls when they overheard a conversation about the Kyrie returning as part of the worship service liturgy. That was back before the start of the Epiphany season, and the answer at that time was "no." However, now that we are in the Easter season, the weird

singing part has returned as a part of the service. Since it is going to be with us in chanted form all this month, and then in the sung Setting 8 form (which the girls enjoy in case you were wondering), let's take a little closer look at what that portion of the liturgy is about and how it came to be part of our worship services.

Instead of permanently knowing it as "the weird singing part" that Pastor/Daddy leads, we'll start with its actual name. As I mentioned, it's the Kyrie, or more fully, the Kyrie Eleison. These words are English letter versions of their ancient Greek counterparts, so a transliteration rather than a translation. Kyrie is the Greek for "Lord" and Eleison is "have mercy." It seems like a very fancy title because it carries over the old Greek, but translated, it's basically just the most important part of that portion of liturgy used as the title.

Using the Greek title anchors the Kyrie to its ancient worship roots. It was among the Greek-speaking Eastern part of the Early Church that the Kyrie as an element of the liturgy of worship developed. These would be the church communities in the Middle East, Turkey, Greece, and Northern Africa, which eventually became the Eastern Orthodox and Coptic churches. It was a very early part or Christian worship there, but didn't come to the West, like the Christians in Europe centered out of Rome, for a few hundred years. When leaders from the West traveled to the East, they brought it back as a worship custom with them, but maintained the practice of speaking it in Greek rather than Latin.

Both the churches of the East, the different branches of the Orthodox Church, and the churches of the West, like Roman Catholics and Protestant offshoots such as us, maintain its use regularly in worship today, but with some differences.

The Kyrie in the Orthodox Church today is very similar to how it was likely used almost two thousand years ago from its beginnings there. The pattern is threefold, representing the Trinity. In the general sense, Orthodox Churches have always leaned toward emphasizing the "three-ness" of God in their theological reflections, where we in the West have emphasized the "one-ness" of God. It makes sense, then, that the Kyrie reflects this general way of thinking. There the Kyrie is "Lord have mercy. Christ have mercy. Lord have mercy." Sometimes this threefold pattern is repeated often in succession with everyone singing it. Also, it is a common response throughout the service. No matter where else and how else it is used in the service, this simple, three-part Kyrie is always found early on and generally after liturgy that is confessional in nature.

In the West, the Kyrie maintained it place at the beginning of the service, although our responses to the Prayers of Intercession (Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer) reflect elements of it used in other places. The Kyrie took on an expanded and call-and-response role in our historic churches, eventually being used a part of a series of liturgy pieces that gave time for long church processions to happen. In this way, the joy and thanksgiving elements of "Lord have mercy" were accentuated. Like the crowds shouting "Hosanna" at Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem meant both the literal "save me" that Hosanna translates as and "thank you for saving us," we sing out to God, "Lord have mercy" both asking for that mercy and joyfully giving thanks for the mercy that God shows us daily.

It's in this spirit of joy and thanksgiving, giving praise to God for Jesus' loving, merciful, saving work for us on the cross and the empty tomb that we come back to the Kyrie every Easter. We also recognize the high, festival nature of this most important of seasons by using pretty much every piece of liturgy that been handed down to us through the ages. On the other hand, the penitential nature of the Kyrie, looking to God for mercy after we confess our sins together, is very appropriate in Advent and Lent, too, but we are often using special litanies in place of much of our regular liturgy pieces at that point. In the summer, we continue to weave the song of praise and cry for mercy by using the Setting 8 Kyrie throughout the Sundays after Pentecost. Should we desire to return to the roots of the Early Church and use the simple, threefold "Lord have mercy. Christ have mercy. Lord have mercy.", that option is among the many our hymn and liturgy compilers have handed down to us in the ELCA.

Whether we trace our use of the Kyrie back to the elaborate entrance procession of popes or the frequent repetition of it in the ancient Orthodox churches, all of us Christians trace the roots of Kyrie Eleison to Scripture. In the Gospel of Matthew, the Canaanite woman, an unnamed father, and two unnamed blind men all cry out to Jesus, "Kyrie eleison." Likewise, in the Gospel of Luke, the Publican, who is contrasted with the self-righteous Pharisee, is praised for his heartfelt prayer, "Lord have mercy on me, a sinner." These prayers and pleas connect with even more ancient Scripture, the Psalms, where "have mercy on me, Lord" is a frequent feature of those looking to God for help, expressing confidence in God's faithfulness, and giving thanks for God's lovingkindness (Psalms 6, 9, 31, and 86 for example).

*Kyrie eleison.* We whisper it in our times of need. We lift it up with hope like incense before God. We sing it with the confidence of the empty tomb before us. We shout is as praise to the One in whose love we have our very being. In all ways, we join our voices with the people of God who for millennia have reached out to the Almighty with these words. *Lord have mercy*.


